Updates with Jo Paton, producer, The Wild Escape

- Earth day was an epic display of collective action by museums, galleries and historic houses across the UK, **thank you for everyone who ran activities inspiring visitors to connect with nature in collections.**

Future funding opportunities

Laura Summers, senior programme manager, Art Fund

- Reimagine grants (funding range £10,000-£50,000) offers support to projects that are creative innovative, impactful and engaging. We want to fund projects that will help organisations reimagine their support for the workforce. Applications close 26 May. [Find out more about Reimagine here.](#)
- Student Opportunities grants help museums build knowledge of how to engage with student/youth. The programme enables students to explore an interest in the arts alongside future career options, while providing organisations with extra capacity which is skilled and accountable. You can apply for £10,000 for up to 100% of the costs. With support from student art pass to help advertise and promote your vacancy. [Find out more Student Opportunities here.](#)

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Aysha Afridi, senior manager-museums, Arts Council England

- Arts Council National Lottery Project Grants offer an open access fund to accredited and non-accredited museums and freelancers working with museums.
 - £1-£30k – takes 6 weeks to come to a decision
 - £30-£100k – takes 12 weeks
 - over £100k – 2 stage process, an expression of interest and then invited to make a full application.
- Projects must be nationally significant and be public facing with public outcomes.

Kelly Spry-Phare, senior engagement manager, London and the South, Heritage Fund

- What is heritage? Anything from the past that we want to save for future generations. As museums you are custodians of heritage.
- Priorities include inclusion of underserved groups, landscapes and nature and, community and local heritage
- National Lottery Grants for heritage:
 - Small: £3-£10k – regional team decision, non-deadlines 8-week decision (max 1 year)
 - Medium: £10-£25k – regional team decision non-deadlines 8-week decision (max 5 years). For medium grants up can submit a project enquiry form and receive feedback in 10 working days.
 - Large: £250k-£5m – committee decision quarterly deadline 12-week decision (max 7 years)
